cost event scheduled at a time we hoped would allow most families to easily participate. The food served was chosen to ensure it was nut free and met the allergy needs of our


young students.

Educators at Horace Mann are using high-leverage teaching



practices to make complex concepts accessible to all learners. Second graders are practicing word sorts to distinguish words by vowel sounds and spelling patterns. This helps with the acquisition of phonics and phonemic awareness skills.

Third graders are working with partners to talk out tricky math review work. This supports students to understand problems and persevere in solving them. As students talk out their thinking with a partner they can identify efficient strategies, learn multiple ways to solve a problem, and correct mistakes by carefully reviewing their work with a peer.



3rd and 5th Grade


Third and fifth graders are initiating their research projects. This week students chose their research topics. Students also began evaluating sources to ensure that the information they found is credible and reliable.


In Music, Kindergartners have been working hard learning a song in Spanish called Los Pollitos. First graders are having a ton of fun singing about ice cream and pizza! They also learned their first folk dance and did an amazing job with a tricky new rhythm game. Second graders have been enjoying a new call and response song from Cape Cod, and have learned all the verses of the Australian

round Kookaburra. Third graders are practicing their multiplication tables with some silly songs about gerbils and elves. Fourth graders just wrapped up a fun song about duct tape, and fourth and fifth graders have been rocking the C chord on their ukuleles!

Lincoln School

Over the past two weeks, fifth graders have been learning about the principles of government in the United States. They've memorized the preamble, learned all about the three branches of government, and are now researching amendments the constitution that were included in the Bill of Rights. After conducting their research, students will write an essay arguing why one of the ten amendments needed to be included in the Bill of Rights. To compile our knowledge, we have been building a KWL chart since the beginning of this unit. While learning about the U.S. government, students have been asking great questions during class discussions.





First grade multilingual learners have been working very hard at the after school program. We have worked on CVC words, specifically identifying beginning, middle, and ending sounds, rhyming words, and are working our way through some decodable readers, while practicing good partner-reading strategies. We are lucky to pair up with fourth grade buddies once a month to practice reading. This past week, students identied components of a sentence--a capital letter, words, spaces between words, and punctuation. We reviewed what makes a sentence different from a picture, a letter, and a word. We completed a sorting activity all together and students completed individual sorting worksheets. Thank you to the PTO for providing first and second graders with the opportunity to learn more about physics with Slapstick Science! We learned about friction, motion, and more! Fun was had by all!







Roosevelt School:

Fourth grade Raven scientists took what they knew about energy from previous learning experiences to help make predictions about which materials are best suited to transfer energy from one object to another. Those experiences included creating circuit boards; getting motors to turn on and off; making motors run on batteries; and controlling the amount of energy necessary to make the motor run. During this lesson, students experimented with various materials to test their predictions and determine which materials make the best conductors and insulators.

Should killer whales be kept in marine parks? Third grade students read a persuasive article on this topic. They formed opinions and published an opinion piece. We spent the rest of the week discussing the features of persuasive texts and thinking about other interesting topics!

Melrose High School



The University of New Hampshire Symphony Orchestra and Chamber Singers will be providing workshops to The Melrose High School Symphony Orchestra and Chorus on Tuesday, January 30th. The UNH ensembles will provide a performance, open to the public, which will also feature a collaborative piece with MHS Students in an evening concert at 7:00PM. Admission is free and the performance will be held in the MVMMS Auditorium.

Seniors have the opportunity to earn the **State Seal of Biliteracy** by demonstrating a high level of proficiency in **English** and a **World Language**. In March, MHS will administer the AAPPL language proficiency assessment to all seniors that are enrolled in Level 5 of any of our Modern World Language classes (French, German, Italian and Spanish); and to any Heritage or Native speaker who would like to participate. For Latin, the ALIRA will be given in place of the AAPPL, as Latin is not one of the languages assessed by the AAPPL assessment. The AAPPL assesses Interpretive Reading and Listening; Interpersonal





Listening/Speaking and Presentational Writing; and ALIRA assesses Interpretive

Reading. For both AAPPL and ALIRA, ratings are assigned according to the ACTFL (American Council on the Teaching of Foreign Languages) Performance Descriptors for Language Learners. To earn the State Seal of Biliteracy, seniors have to score 472 or higher on Grade 10 ELA MCAS; and Intermediate High in all domains of the AAPPL/ALIRA assessment. This cutting-edge assessment empowers our students and our World Language program; and students are acknowledged by a nationally recognized organization. We wish all the best to our seniors who are taking these assessments. Let's celebrate **multilingualism**!

The MHS French students and their families attended a meeting about the **French Exchange Trip**, which will be happening in just a few weeks. The agenda covered different





topics, not limited to, student behavior expectations, packing tips and personal safety. The Melrose students will be traveling to Saint-Witz, France for a couple of weeks and will be staying with their host families. They will be visiting some great landmarks such as the American cemetery in Normandie; Versailles, the Musee d'Orsay, the Eiffel Tower in Paris; and much more!
